Reflection
Last week we celebrated Valentine's Day. It is a time when we tell friends and family how much we love them. We concentrate on the warm fuzzy feelings we have for certain people. It is often a fun time when we are happy and feeling good.

Love has many different sides to it. It is not only that warm fuzzy feeling but is also an action word which is the most important aspect of it. To love someone means doing something to make their lives better and to make them happy. This can be really hard especially when it is for someone we don't particularly like or who we think is not a nice person. It can also be hard when it is not something we want to do or like to do. God is teaching us today that it is really important to do this. In the first reading we are told to "love our neighbors as ourselves," in the Gospel, "love our enemies," and in the psalm we learn that "The Lord is kind." We know that God loves everyone and we know that God wants us to act as God does and to love everyone, too. That does not mean to have a warm fuzzy feeling for everyone. It means that we are to do things to help others and to make them happy. Not only does this mean we need to do things but to also NOT do things that make others sad such as talking about them behind their backs saying mean things about them. We would not want others to do that to us so we should not do it to anyone either. God wants us to be nice/kind to everyone. We need to remember that we don't know everything that is going on in a person's life or what they are thinking and feeling. In addition to being nice to everyone, helping everyone, we should also pray for everyone.

Discussion

1. Can you think of someone in your class, in your neighborhood or even in your family who many people don't seem to like, either because they are different or because they are mean? (Ask them to describe that person without using names or anything that will identify them)
2. Try to imagine you are that person –
 - a. How do you feel when others don't invite you to play or sit with them at lunch?
 - b. How do you feel when you hear others saying mean things about you?
 - c. How do you feel when others are mean to you?
3. How does God want us to treat those people?

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Activity: Post Valentine's Day Valentines

Materials needed: A package of large valentines (you should be able to find them for clearance prices after Valentine's Day), or cut-out hearts on red or pink paper, writing or drawing supplies.

Instructions:

Ask the class to make valentines for people who don't normally get a lot of valentines. Instruct them to not only sign their name but to also write or draw something on the valentine telling the person something good that they notice about them or appreciate in them.
