Jesus used this story to teach the people:

“The kingdom of heaven is like what happened

to come to the banquet,
but the guests refused.

He sent other servants to say to the guests,
‘The banquet is ready!
My cattle and prize calves have all been prepared.

Reflection

Today our readings talk about having a party. Remember your last birthday party. Did you pick out Scooby Doo plates, a Clifford cake, Dora the Explorer napkins or Spider Man balloons?

Imagine your birthday is coming soon and your mom or your dad asks you what kind of party you like? [ask the following questions]

What kind of cake do you want?

What kind of ice cream?

What kind of decorations do you want?

What kind of activities or games would you play?

What kind of take-home treats would you give to your guests?

Finally, whom do you want to invite?

Now that we have the party ready and the guests invited – we are like the king in today's Gospel who prepared the party for his son.

What happened in the story? [the invited guests did not come]

So suppose you are ready for the party to begin at 2 o'clock and no one comes to the party? Your mom and dad get on their cell phones and start calling the parents of the guests. They hear these excuses

Oh, my son can't come because he has a baseball game.

Oh, Mary can't come because she has a dance competition this afternoon.

My son, Jimmy decided he wanted to play his new computer game today.

Meredith has piano lessons.

You would be so sad and disappointed. But your mom or dad would know what to do. They would continue to make calls and invite others to come to the party.

And when those friends arrived, it turned out to be the best party ever.

Jesus invites us to follow him, to be his friend and to come to his party – his feast – the Mass each week.

Discussion Questions

1. How can I live the message in today's Gospel message this week?
2. How do I welcome friends into our lives each day?
3. How can I include the lonely people on the playground into our activity?
4. How can I invite the kids in my neighborhood to be a part of my circle of friends?
5. How can I be kind to my brothers and sisters this week?

Activity

2. Pass out some Birthday stickers to each child.
3. Have each child pray for a friend whom they would invite to a party.
