Readings:

Genesis	18:1-10a

Colossians	1:27-28
Luke	10:38-42

Reflection:
Martha and Mary weren't little kids in this story but they are behaving like it. Can't you just see Martha rushing around getting the house cleaned and the food cooked while Mary just sat around talking to Jesus? Can you hear Martha whining, "Make Mary help! She not doing anything! I'm doing all the work and she is just sitting!" To which Mary whines back, "Tell her to leave me alone! Jesus is here!" Jesus has to play "Mom" and say "Now girls, stop fighting! Martha come sit with us." Jesus says in the Gospel that Mary was the one that was doing the right thing even though Martha was rushing around doing everything she was supposed to do when someone has company over. Jesus is telling us that it is important to spend time with him. The only way we can listen and learn from Him is to stop what we are doing and quietly listen. Our lives are so busy these days. We rush around with school, sports, friends, scouts, etc. We squeeze in time to help at church and to do service projects. Even though those are all good things, Jesus wants us to slow down occasionally and spend some quiet time with Him. That is part of the reason going to Church on Sunday is so important. We take time out of our week to spend time with Jesus. One day out of a week is not enough, though. We need to take time every day to spend with Jesus to listen to Him and to learn from Him.

Discussion:

1. Which sister do you think you are more like? Why?
2. Why did Jesus say Mary was doing the right thing?
3. How can you find time in each day to spend with Jesus?
4. How do you think you can listen to Jesus?

Activity: Telephone

Materials: None

Game: Telephone

Place the children in one line, side by side. Whisper something like “Jesus loves you” into the first child’s ear, ask them to whisper what they heard to the person next to them, the next kid does the same thing until the message reaches the last child. Ask that child to say aloud what they heard – more than likely it will not be your original message. Discuss the reasons why the message did not make it correctly all the way to the end. It is hard to hear. You have to be very quiet and listen very hard. Discuss how this might be like listening to Jesus.
