Readings:

First Letter of Paul to Timothy	1:12-15b
Psalm	111:1-2, 3-4, 7-8
Luke	15:11-32

Reflection:

Today Jesus tells us a story about a boy who decides he wants to leave his family to go have fun. When he runs out of money he decides to go home and ask for forgiveness for leaving. Jesus is using the story to teach us that God will ALWAYS love us and we should never be afraid to ask for forgiveness. We are not perfect. From time to time we will make choices and do things that are not very good. No matter what we do, though, God will love us and forgive us if we ask. This is called unconditional love. It is a huge gift that we receive from God and others such as our parents. It helps us to know that we are good and lovable and deserve respect and love. It also helps us to respect others since we know that God loves them unconditionally, too.

Discussion:

1. How do you think the father in the story felt when his son left?
2. How do you think God feels when we make bad choices?
3. How do you think the son felt when he realized he made a mistake?
4. Do you think he was afraid to go back to his father?
5. How do you think the son felt when the father forgave him and threw a party for him?
6. How can you tell God you are sorry when you make a mistake?
7. How do you feel after you ask forgiveness from God, your parents or someone you have hurt?

Activity: Chutes and Ladders

Materials: Several copies of the Chutes and Ladders board game or materials to make one big one of your own. Use the board game as a template.

Activity: You can either split the class into smaller groups to play the Chutes and Ladders board game or you can create a large game board on a black board or dry erase board on the wall, personalizing the chutes and the ladders with actions/people/places the class would be familiar with. Each child could create their own "game piece" (either a cardboard cut out with tape on the back or their initial written in chalk). Discuss the object of the game being to get to heaven and how on that journey we encounter chutes and ladders along the way.
