FIRST READING

Prayer:

Readings:

Second book of Kings	5:14-17
Psalm	98:1,2-3ab,3cd-4
Second Letter of Paul to Timothy	2:11-13
Luke	17:11-19

Reflection:

The men in today's gospel have a terrible disease called leprosy. In Jesus' time, people were afraid of that disease so anyone who had it was forced to stay away from other people who didn't have it, including their family and friends. Not only did these men have a terrible disease, but some of them were also from a different town. In those days, people from different towns didn't like each other. Most people would not have even talked to these men but Jesus talks to them and heals them. After they were healed, however, only 1 man came back to say "thank you." It is easy to think that the other 9 men were terrible, ungrateful people but if we are honest they are probably more like us than the one who gave thanks. I think that most of us would be very excited to be healed because we could be with our families and friends. We could go back to work to earn a living. We could go out in public without feeling ashamed. We would feel healthy again. I think we would be so excited, for most of us, our first thought would be to run and tell our families and everyone else, forgetting to go back and say, "Thank you." This happens with us every day. God and others are so good to us and we forget to show our gratitude. This gospel reminds us to remember how important it is to be grateful and to say, "thank you" for "All Good Gifts" really do come from God who loves us and wants us to be happy!

Discussion:

Write the words "Thank You God For..." on the top of a chalk board or large piece of paper. Invite the class to brainstorm all the things they are thankful for. Write them on board/paper or let them write their own suggestion if they are old enough.

Activity: Thank You Notes

Materials Needed: Thank you notes and envelopes – 2 for each child, pencils, pens, markers, stickers

Directions:

1. Give each child 2 Thank You Notes and envelopes.
2. Ask each child to write or draw a thank you note to someone (parent, friend, teacher, priest) to thank them for being part of their life.
3. Ask each child to write or draw a thank you note to God to thank God for being a part of their life and for all of the gifts that God has given them.
4. Instruct the children to give their thank you notes to the people they make them for.
5. Collect the Thank You Notes to God and present them to the priest when the class returns to Mass or after Mass.
