#### Reflection

Did you ever notice how sunflowers naturally follow the sun? Once the plant grows up and the flower blooms, the flower always faces the sun. So when the sun rises in the East in the morning — the sunflower faces that direction. As the sun travels across the sky during the day the sunflower will turn its face and follow the sun to the west where it sets each evening.

We, too, can follow Jesus, the Son. He encourages, guides, and helps us to grow in becoming more loving with our family members in our home, and with our friends in the neighborhood. We have many opportunities this summer to be kind toward our brothers and sisters. We can share our games, take turns, help around the house — without even being asked or reminded.

We can follow Jesus the Son, by remembering our prayers in the morning, at meals, and night before we go to sleep at night. We can pay attention to people who may be lonely or sad. We can help a neighbor with yard work. We can share a smile or a hug with others.

Our love for Jesus is so wonderful that we can't keep it inside of us. We must share the Good News with others.
