Readings:

Malachi 2:8-10
Psalm 25:4-5abc,6 and 7cd, 8-9
Letter of Paul to the Thessalonians 2:7-9, 13
Matthew 23:1-12

Reflection and Discussion:

Today we learn that the way we live our lives teaches about Jesus and the Gospel just as much as our words do.

Halloween is tomorrow. In the evening many of us will be dressing up, wearing masks or make-up and pretending to be someone else. What's interesting, though, is in actuality, most of the time we are wearing a mask to cover up who we really are. Instead of showing the world that we are Christians who love and serve the Lord, we wear a mask that shows the world something else; maybe how cool we think we are, how pretty, how popular, how smart, how athletic, how talented. None of those things are bad but for them to be the only thing the world sees is not fair because it does not teach them how we are supposed to live. It focuses on us instead of on God.

Jesus tells us that we must practice what we preach so if we say we are Christians and should love everyone then we must act that way and not just talk about it.

Discussion:

1. How can we show that world that we are Christians?
2. Why is it hard to show the world that we are Christians?
3. How does it help others when they see us acting as a Christian?
4. How can we help each other be good Christian role models?

Activity:

Materials Needed: Paper Masks – one for each child (the kind that only cover around the eyes. These can be bought cheaply at the dollar store or made with card board and elastic cord).

Divide the children into small groups. Ask them to wear their masks and create scenarios showing how they are not acting like their true Christian selves. Have them present their short skits to the class. Then have them remove their mask and create another scenario where they are acting as a Christian. Have them present these skits to the class.
