Thirty-Third Sunday of Ordinary Time

Readings:

1 Thessalonians	5: 1-6
Psalms	27: 1, 13-14
Matthew	25: 14-15, 19-21

Reflection:

In today's Gospel, Jesus tells us another story. It is about a wealthy man who is going away for a long time. Before he leaves he asks 3 of his servants to help care for his property. He gives each one some money (called talents in the story). When he returns he finds that 2 of the servants used the money but in such a way that they made even more money. This made the man very happy. The third servant, however, was afraid of what the man would do if something happened to the money so he decided to bury it to keep it safe. The man got very angry with this servant because he hadn't made more money as the other 2 servants had done.

In this story, Jesus is the wealthy man and we are the servants. Jesus is gone for a while in heaven but he left us his property, his kingdom, to care for. He gave each of us gifts to use to increase the kingdom. He wants us to be like the first and second servants. He wants us to take risks and use the gifts that He has given us. We can do this by donating our time and whatever skills that we have to help others and the church. For example, if someone is a good singer, they can join the choir and help bring people closer to God through music.

Discussion:

1. What gifts/talents did God give you?
2. How do you use those gifts/talents?
3. How could you use them to help build God's kingdom?
4. Do you think that God is happy with the way that you use the gifts/talents that have been given to you?

Activity:

Ask the children to draw a picture of one of their talents. This picture can then be placed inside a small box and then wrapped as a present. On the tag, put the student's name in the "To:" section and "God" in the "From:" section. An alternative would be to create a picture of a gift, make enough copies for everyone in the class. The tag should say, "To: _____, From: God." They can fill in their name and draw a picture inside the gift of a talent that God has given them.
