First Sunday of Advent—Cycle B

Prayer:

Jesus, you want us to be ready so we will see you when you come, even if we don't know when. I want to be ready and need your help. Come Lord Jesus into my heart. Amen.

Readings:

1 Corinthians 1:3-9
Psalm 85:8, 9, 10
Mark 13:33: 3-7

Catechist:

This season of Advent is a time of preparation, waiting and longing for the coming of Jesus. Today, the Church celebrates a New Year, that is, the Liturgical New Year, Advent Cycle B of the three cycles of Sunday readings. The seasons of Advent and Christmas celebrate the "coming" of Jesus. The preparation during Advent has a three-fold purpose. The Coming of Jesus in the flesh, *Immanuel*, "God with us";The Coming of Jesus in the Eucharist, "this is My Body, My Blood" food for the journey; and the preparation for the Second Coming, *Parousia* "presence" or "arrival" of Jesus Coming to make way for His faithful Servants—those who keep watch. The Liturgical color of Advent is Purple, or in some parishes a blue-purple, signals penitential, thus the Preparation. This concept is difficult for children to understand and the focus is usually the preparation for Christmas—the Christ Child. For adults the chant of "O Come, O Come, *Immanuel*" speaks of the longing for Christ' return. For children it is a Christmas Carol.

Be ready for the coming of the Lord! People are now getting excited. Christmas will soon be here! In what ways do we see people getting ready to celebrate Christmas? (what sights, sounds, TV ads, outward signs). What is Christmas about? What do we celebrate? (lots of gifts, Santa, or the birth of Jesus). What changes do you see in church? Does something look different? (color purple, four advent candles, music).

The sights, sounds, music and TV we see outside, are not the same as the sights, sounds, and music we see inside the Church. In today's Gospel Jesus tells us to be prepared. To get ready. What are we supposed to get ready for? (this may seem a trick question for some children).

Each year the Church invites us to remember and celebrate the Birth of Jesus, God's gift to us. Each one of us has a birthday – the day we were born. Jesus was born and grew up just like. When Jesus was older he taught many people many things about God. Jesus taught the little children that God loves each one of us. When we prepare to celebrate our birthday we get really excited days before and it is gets really hard to wait. We sing a special song. We open special gifts.

- 1. How do you prepare for Christmas? Do you do special things together as a family? Do you have special people come over to celebrate?
- During this time of Advent we are given four whole weeks to prepare for the Coming of Jesus. A long time to wait. To help us remember how long we need to wait, a special decoration is made, called an Advent wreath. Four candles placed around a circle of

evergreen. Three candles are purple, like the colors in church, and one candle is pink. When the pink one is lit, we know it is not long before Christmas is here. *The Light of Christ burns evergreen with Life in a circle of love that is never-ending.*

Activity:

Make a paper Advent wreath. Construction paper works best. Cut our four yellow flames, three purple and one pink rectangle (1"x 5 $\frac{1}{2}$ "), using half sheet of green (8 $\frac{1}{2}$ "x11") cut corners to make it and oval or cut strips of green paper to glue in front of candles, and one white sheet of (8 $\frac{1}{2}$ "x11") for background.

As a family, sit at the table for dinner, light the Advent candle, and pray together.
