Prayer:

Readings:

Is 53:10-11;

Ps 33:4-5, 18-19, 20, 22;

Hebrews 4:14-16;

Mark 10:35-45

Reflection:

This is World Mission Sunday. There are people around the world who need our help. They need us to pay attention to their needs and not just be concerned about our own wishes and needs. This is the point of the Gospel story: James and John are worried for themselves. The other disciples didn't feel it was right that Jesus promised James and John something they thought they couldn't have. They were only concerned with 'being important,' they weren't acting like Jesus would want. James and John would have to endure all that Jesus would — drinking the cup — being open to give his life blood as a sign of love and forgiveness; being baptized into eternal life in God.

Jesus clearly says: "You don't know what you are asking." But James and John willingly commit themselves.

In reality: We all are called to sit at Jesus' right and left side. We, too, are called to commit to giving our life and to be willing to die for love of God like Jesus did. Do we understand what that means? Probably not. We have to

grow into its full meaning. When we act like Jesus, then we can sit there in humility because we know what it means — we are to serve.

James and John had a WISH and Jesus says: If you act and become like me, then, YES.. What if we each had a WISH and Jesus fulfilled it. What would you WISH for? Well, on this World Mission Sunday: What would we WISH for all people of this world? Even for the 'world.' There are many needs and we are called to be Jesus' response as best we can. You have heard of "Make a Wish Foundation." They grant wishes for children with terminal illnesses or significant challenges in life. And you have heard of "Jerry's Kids." On Mission Sunday, and every day we are called to be "Jesus' Kids" and serve one another with love, mercy and kindness. How often do we put the needs of others before our own? That is a practical way we learn to be 'missionaries.'

If you have access to the Maryknoll magazine or some other visual to show the children what missionaries and mission work is about. There are many missionary communities and service groups both with church affiliations and with governments.

Activities:

Perhaps you can have magazines and the children can cut or tear pictures out that show how people need others to make their WISH for a better life come true. Or you could make a scroll and list the needs of others — to be taken back into church and placed by the altar—or somewhere acceptable to show what the children wish for the world. The Glenmary Community serves in rural, often poverty 'rich' communities. Perhaps you could write a letter to a 'mission' parish or diocese just to let them know you are praying for them. Or perhaps a parish in New Orleans or along the coast. be asked; giving of a toy or something that is

'mine' to another; attending to my chores without being asked; giving something I don't need to the St Vincent De Paul or Thrift Shop. Then pass out the hearts to be their reminder.

To Conclude the Session:

Remind the children that Jesus said: Serve. The first will be last, Jesus says. This week, let's promise to let others go first. Let's promise to help someone in need. Let's truly do something for another without wanting something in return. Make a wishing well, or scroll, and write on it a WISH for the week, i.e., the suggestions mentioned or something like: I wish to share my favorite toy with my brother/sister. I WISH to pray for poor children. If your group is large, you select an action/concern for them. This would help in having time to share.

Prayer: Dear Jesus: Fill our hearts with your love so we can always be willing to have 'biggie sized' hearts! Help us to do the 'one more thing' this week which will show our love for you!

Prayer:

Dear Jesus, we find it hard to go to the back of the line; to let others be first. Help us to remember, as children of God, we should be willing to let others go before us. Help us, Jesus, to act like you act. AMEN.
