SECOND SUNDAY OF ADVENT CYCLE C

We can give the gift of God's love. (Review Advent Activities Section)

Prayer: Dear God, John the Baptist told others, with great joy, how you are God's Son. With joy, we want to tell others about you because people still need to know you love them. Thank you for loving us; help us to show love to those who are poor and need someone to love them especially. Amen.

Readings: Baruch 5:1-9; Philippians 1:4-6, 8-11; Luke 3:1-6

Reflection: The prophet, Baruch, tells of very sad and hard time. Jerusalem had been destroyed and the people are far from home. St Paul tells his new disciples to learn to be a good community as followers of Jesus. John the Baptist challenges his listeners to reform their lives and change their society. However, all three readings reflect a deep sense of hope and a desire for justice. Baruch implies that no obstacle will keep God's children from returning home. John's time in the desert, like the time of Jesus to follow, gives the courage to voice, cry out, for all God's people to follow their lead. God has made it clear throughout our history, God is who us, Emmanuel but is not a God over us! The 'making the way' is not by taking another route, but of carefully and persistently transforming the way we travel—inwardly and outwardly; as individuals and as a society. We shouldn't be surprised that the Scripture stories are not about Jesus' birth but about us being on the way to Jesus' coming in glory—and our responsibility to make that way smooth!

Activities: John the Baptist was the first person in the New Testament that recognizes Jesus. John wasn't a Rabbi, Scribe, Pharisee or even a disciple of Jesus—and doesn't become 'named' apostle. Talk to the children about how important it is that we learn to recognize Jesus in one another—even in those that are outside the Christian or Catholic Church. It is important that the children struggle with understanding that all people are God's children; all people can be recognized for doing good and loving deeds. The difference with us, our 'named' Saints, is that we, as a faith community, proclaim Jesus as the reason for our actions. Consider using the KEY WORDS like flash cards to engage the children in learning about concepts, people and ideas shown. Help them to think of other stories where the same word or person is used.



To Conclude the Session: Remember to collect Christmas cards for the card gift Box. Do the children have the names of people to whom the cards can be sent? Talk a little about each person. If not, just mention children/people by need: Homeless, hungry, etc. In litany fashion, have each child place their card in the box and everyone else says: **We can give the gift of God's love.**
