GOSPEL

We have come from the east to worship the king.

† A reading from the holy gospel according to Matthew

2:1-12

When Jesus was born in the village of Bethlehem in Judea,
Herod was king.

During this time some wise men from the east came to Jerusalem and said,
“Where is the child born to be king of the Jews?
We saw his star in the east and have come to worship him.”

When King Herod heard about this, he was worried,
and so was everyone else in Jerusalem.

Herod brought together all the chief priests and the teachers
of the Law of Moses and asked them,
“Where will the Messiah be born?”

They told him,

“He will be born in Bethlehem, just as the prophet wrote,

“Bethlehem in the land of Judea,
you are very important among the towns of Judea.
From your town will come a leader,
who will be like a shepherd for my people Israel.”



Herod secretly called in the wise men
and asked them when they had first seen the star.
He told them, "Go to Bethlehem and search carefully for the child.

THE EPIPHANY OF THE LORD ABC

Prayer: Loving God, Thank you for the gift of Jesus, the light of our lives. Help us to continually offer our gifts to you. In Jesus' name we pray. Amen

Readings: Isaiah 60:1-6; Psalm 72:1,2,10abc, 10de-11; Matthew 2:1-12

Reflection:

Today is the feast of Epiphany which is the celebration of God coming into our lives. The gospel tells the story of the Three Wisemen and their journey to see the new king, baby Jesus. Try to imagine that you are one of the Wisemen. You see a new star in the sky that outshines all of the other stars. You know in your heart that this star must be shining for a very special event – a new king. You don't know where this new king is or anything else about him but you leave your home anyway to follow the star. You bring with you the most precious gift that you have to give to the new king. When you arrive you find a poor mother and father with a baby. (Discuss Questions 1 – 4). Those Wisemen must have been very brave to follow a star to an unknown place and to bring precious gifts for someone they didn't even know.

Believe it or not, this story happens to us over and over every day. We ARE the Wisemen. We experience little epiphanies (God coming into our lives) all the time, for example, when we see a beautiful flower, a rainbow, a friendly smile or feel the love of our parent's arms around us. God has also sent many stars to guide us. Our parents, teachers, priests and other religious, friends, animals, plants, books, and music are some of the things that can help guide us to God. Like the Wisemen, we bring gifts to offer to God. The great part is that God is happy with any of our gifts that we offer. We do not have to bring gold, frankincense and myrrh; we merely have to offer something of ourselves. (Discuss questions 5 – 7).

Discussion:

Ask the children to pretend they are one of the Wisemen.

1. Why do you want to follow this star?
2. How do you feel about leaving your home to travel to somewhere you don't know?
3. Why do you want to bring the new king a gift?
4. How do you feel when you first see the Baby Jesus?



Ask the children to answer these questions personally

5. How do you see God in your life each day? What reminds you that God is with you?

6. Who or what is a star guiding you to God each day?

7. What gifts do you have to offer to God?

Activity: Gifts for God.

Materials needed: Small boxes, 3 x 5 pieces of paper, markers/crayons, gift bows, wrapping paper, tape, gift tags, the book, "The Littlest Angel" or the movie "The Little Drummer Boy." Show the ending of the movie "The Little Drummer Boy" or tell/read the highlights of the book, "The Littlest Angel."

Instruct the children to draw on the 3x5 paper, a picture of their gift to the baby Jesus. Have them insert the pictures into a small box, wrap it, decorate with a bow and place a gift tag (To Jesus, From [the child's name]).

Tell them to take the gift home and keep it by their beds to remind them each night and each morning to thank God for the many gifts they have been given and to offer to God a gift of their own.
