GOSPEL

Happy are the poor.

† A reading from the holy gospel according to Luke

6:17, 20-23

Jesus and his apostles went down from the mountain
and came to some flat, level ground.
Many other disciples were there to meet him.
Large crowds of people from all over Judea, Jerusalem,
and the coastal cities of Tyre and Sidon were there too.

Jesus looked at his disciples and said:
“God will bless you people who are poor.
His kingdom belongs to you!
God will bless you hungry people.
You will have plenty to eat!
God will bless you people who are crying.
You will laugh!

“God will bless you when others hate you
and won’t have anything to do with you.
God will bless you when people insult you
and say cruel things about you,
all because you are a follower of the Son of Man!
Long ago your own people did these same things to the prophets.

“So when this happens to you,
be happy and jump for joy!
You will have a great reward in heaven.”

Readings: Jeremiah 17:7-8; Psalm 40:1 and 2de, 3, 17; 1 Corinthians 15:12, 16-20; Luke 6:17, 20-23

Reflection:

This week St. Luke gives us his version of the Beatitudes in which Jesus teaches us that when we are good and do what is right we will be blessed and happy no matter what else is going on in our lives. We are blessed and happy because we love and trust God even when we are poor, even when we are hungry, even when we are sad, and even when other people don't like us and say mean things about us. This does not mean that the only time we are blessed is when we are poor, hungry, sad, and lonely but in those times if we continue to lean on God then we know everything will be all right. It's when we have lots of things, food and friends that it can be hard to remember to love and rely on God. It is hard to remember that we NEED God when we have everything else. Needing and loving God helps us to be good people and to love and help others. Jesus is telling us we need to be careful so that everything we have: our nice homes, clothes, food, friends and popularity don't keep us from trusting God. We need to know that the good things in our lives come from God and must be shared.

Discussion:

When Jesus says, "Blest are you poor..." He means those who have trusted in God in hard times. *Have you ever felt God with you during a difficult time? How did it help you? How can you help those who are poor? What can you share with others?*

When Jesus says, "Blest are you who are hungry..." He means all kinds of hunger not just food. People can be hungry for many things such as attention, love, education, freedom, justice, God. *Have you ever felt hungry for something other than food? How did it make you feel? How can you help those who are hungry?*



When Jesus says, “Blest are you who weep...” He means those who are hurt, sad and lonely. *Have you ever helped someone who was hurt, sad or lonely? Could God have been using you to care for that person and bless them?*

Activity:

Materials: Large paper hearts in pink, red and white. Crayons/markers/colored pencils.

Ask the children to draw and color a picture on their hearts of them happily caring for someone else or God’s creation.

Discuss how we are in God’s heart and how God blesses us when we care for the poor, the hungry, the sad, and the lonely.
