Readings:

Colossians 3:1-4

Psalm 147:1,3-4, 5 and 7

Luke 12:16-21

Reflection:

Knowing God means living our lives differently. Since we know how much God loves us and everyone else in the world we have to make choices that honor that love God has for us. We can't just store it away like the man in the Gospel.

We have to use that love to show others how much God loves them too. The last couple of weeks we have heard stories about people making choices. The Good Samaritan story told about several men who decided to either help an injured man or to leave him. The story of Martha and Mary with Jesus showed a choice the women had to either do their jobs or to hang out with Jesus listening to him. These stories show us how hard it can be sometimes to make decisions and to act how God would like us to. But how can we do any differently?

Discussion::

- How do you know that God loves you?
- How do you think God wants us to act?
- What are some things we can do to show how much we love God?



Activity: Heads or Tails Game

Materials: No materials are mandatory. Optional materials could be pictures of various actions and/or prizes for whoever wins the game.

Game: Have the entire class stand. Tell them you will be reading various actions. They need to decide if those actions are Godly (living our lives with God) or Worldly (living our lives without God). If they think it is Godly, they need to put their hands on their head. If they think it is Worldly they put their hands on their bottoms. Briefly discuss the correct answer. If they chose the correct answer they remain standing. If they did not, they sit down. The winner is the last one standing.

Explain that some Worldly actions are not necessarily bad but that Godly actions are better. Also, Godly actions are not necessarily less fun! Below is a list of some actions you can use. Mix them up. Feel free to create some of your own.

- Littering
- Recycling
- Playing video games while your parents clean the house
- Helping your neighbor rake leaves.
- Yelling at your sister.
- Coloring with your little brother.
- Sleeping in on Sunday morning.
- Going to Church
- Lying around all day.
- Exercising and/or playing sports.
- Disobeying your parents
- Doing what is expected before being asked.
- Playing on the playground with only your friends
- Playing on the playground with your friends and inviting someone who doesn't have many friends to join you
- Bullying
