Cycle A

FIRST READING

They chose seven men filled with the Spirit.

A reading from the Acts of the Apostles

6:1-7a

A lot of people were becoming followers of the Lord.
But some of the ones who spoke Greek started complaining
about the ones who spoke Aramaic.
They complained that the Greek-speaking widows
were not given their share
when the food supplies were handed out each day.

The twelve apostles called the whole group of followers together
and said,
“We should not give up preaching God’s message
in order to serve at tables.

Prayer:

Readings:

Acts of the Apostles 6:1-7a

John 14:1-12

Reflection:

How do we know our parents love us? Is it because they buy us things and take us places? Is it because they always say nice things to us and let us do whatever we want? Of course not because that would mean if our parents couldn't afford to buy us a lot of things that they didn't love us or if they punish us when we do something wrong that they don't love us. We know that this is untrue. We know our parents love us because they take care of us and teach us how to be good people even though sometimes that means that they must punish us when we have misbehaved. We have faith that our parents will always love us no matter what. They don't have to keep proving it to us. We just know.

In today's gospel, Jesus is almost begging us and the apostles to have faith in God. You can almost feel his frustration when the apostles keep asking Him to show them the Father and show them the Kingdom. Jesus keeps saying, "But I have shown you! All you have to do is see me and what I have done and you have then seen the Father." He is frustrated not only because He has just spent years showing them what God and the Kingdom were all about and they still don't seem to get it, but also because He knows if they can have a little bit of faith, they will be able to do great things.

In today's first reading, the apostles appoint some new people to help lead the church because they didn't want to have to worry about taking care of everything. They wanted to be free to be able to do God's work. This is what Jesus is talking about when he says that if we have faith we will be able to do great things. If we know that God loves us and takes care of us then we are free from worry and free from trying to take care of things by ourselves. We are free to concentrate on how we can make the world a better place and to show everyone God's love. Those are great things especially when lots of people live like that. The world could be changed!



Activity: Trust Fall

Divide the class into groups of 6. Have 5 children stand behind one child. One should be at the head and two on each side. Instruct the child in the middle to close their eyes (or use a blind fold) and fall backwards, trusting that the other members of their group will catch them. Make sure the area is clear so that they can't get hurt. The person standing directly behind the child in the center should catch them by the shoulders not the head. Have each member of the group take a turn falling.

Discussion:

How did you feel when you were standing there getting ready to fall?

Was it hard to trust that the other members of your group were going to catch you?

How did it feel when you were falling?

How did it feel when they caught you?

If we can have faith in our group that they will not let us get hurt and faith in our parent's love, can't we also have faith in God's love and care for us? God who created the world and who died for us. Those are much bigger things than our group or our parent's have done for us.
