Readings:

Ezekiel 33:7-9

Psalm 95:1-2, 6-7abcd, 7e-9

Romans 13:8-10

Matthew 18: 15-17

Reflection:

"I have chosen you to love others as you love yourself." This is what God is teaching us today. Specific examples are also given in today's readings. We are told that we must tell people when they are doing something wrong and help them do what is right. That may not seem like a "loving" thing to do. It will make the person angry and hurt. They won't "feel" loved... at least not at first.

What is love? (Let the children give several answers).

The word "love" can be used as a noun, a thing. It is a feeling. The word "love" is also a verb. It is something you do.

Loving someone is different than just feeling love for them. It is doing something.

Parents want their kids to feel loved. Do children feel loved when their parents let them do whatever they want so they can have that warm, fuzzy, happy feeling? What would you think if your parents let you do anything you wanted? (Let the children answer). It would be fun at first but what about when you got hurt or sick? Would you still feel that warm, happy, loving feeling? In reality, kids think that their parents don't love them if they let them do anything they want. Parents must set rules because they love their kids, to keep them safe, healthy, happy and to teach them how to grow up into healthy and happy adults. Making sure their kids follow the rules is not always fun and it doesn't always give the parents or the kids the warm, fuzzy, happy feeling but it is the way that parents love their children.



“Love your neighbor as you love yourself.” How do we love ourselves? Do we go around kissing ourselves and telling ourselves that we love us? We would look pretty silly! We love ourselves the same way that our parents love us. We take care of ourselves to make sure we grow up healthy and happy. That means we take care of our bodies by eating the right foods, exercising, and getting enough rest. It means taking care of our minds by working hard to learn in school. It means taking care of our spirits by choosing good friends and being a good friend to them and by praying and going to church.

If we are doing all of that to love ourselves, God says that we must also do all of that to love everyone else. As the scripture readings today tell us, that sometimes means letting another person know that they are doing something that is not loving.

Discussion:

Using the word “love” as an action word:

1. How can you actively love your family?
2. How can you actively love you friends?
3. How can you actively love some of your classmates whom you may not really “like”?

Activity
